

Q1 - What month did you complete your counseling degree?





It's the best state school in the area. I also knew one of the faculty members who I respect. They encouraged me.










Q10 - If you were eligible to become a school counselor, did you take obtain your School



Q12 - How well did WKU counseling program prepare you for working in the field?




